
Large Crowds Enjoy The Past Passed Here

May 7–9 at the 22nd annual celebration of Chippewa County history during The Past Passed Here. Nearly 500 visitors enjoyed this year's event during the three days open to the public, with many guests also visiting the Chippewa Area History Center across the street from the camp set up in Marshall Park.

CELEBRATING CENTURY FARMS

A Century Farm in Eagle Point Township: The Rasmus Farm

In 1992, the Rasmus Farm, located in Township 29N, Range 08W, Section 28, celebrated 100 years of ownership in the Rasmus family. The farm is located on Hwy S, east of Chippewa Falls; the Old Abe Bike Trail runs through the property and the brick Rasmus School (now a real estate office) was once part of the property. The 350 acre farm was acquired in 1892 by brothers Martin Rasmus and Mathias Rasmus(1858-1899). The brothers immigrated to Chippewa County from Forde, in the province of Gunnfjord, Norway; Martin in 1865 and Mathias in 1878.

Mathias and his wife, Inga Klopstad Eliasdatter (1869-1953), were married in 1889 and lived on the farm in Eagle Point township. Martin lived on his farm southeast of Bloomer. Five children were born to Mathias and Inga; Alma, Elizabeth, Dana, Alvin, and Carl. Mathias became ill in 1898 and died on November 28, 1899, at the age of 41. Prior to his death, Mathias hired his nephew, Andrew Rasmus (1872-1936), to manage the farm.

Following the death of her husband, Mathias, Inga married Andrew Rasmus on December 16, 1900, and together they continued to manage the Rasmus farm. Five children were born to Inga and Andrew Rasmus; Martin, Herman, Ingolf, Marian, and Margaret. In 1906, Andrew and Inga changed from crop farming to dairy farming. In 1910, the family added a new crop of tobacco to their farm and continued to grow it until the prices fell in 1920. Martin, Andrew, and Inga Rasmus jointly owned the farm until 1916 at which time they divided it, with Martin taking the west half and Andrew and Inga taking the east half. At that time, Andrew and Inga built the stucco house, which still stands today, along with a new modern barn that allowed them to expand their dairy herd and start a retail milk route under the name "A.H. Rasmus and Sons." Andrew died of an accident in 1936.

In 1939, Andrew and Inga's son, Martin W. Rasmus (1901-1990), purchased the west half of the original farm from the heirs of Martin Rasmus. Martin W. Rasmus married Elizabeth Kalk (1905-1981) on October 1, 1940; one son, John, was born to them in 1942. Martin W. and Elizabeth razed the original house that stood on the west half of the farm and built a modern brick house that still stands on the property. In 1973, John Rasmus, the son of Martin W. and Elizabeth Rasmus, purchased the east half of the original Rasmus farm. Following the death of his parents, John and his wife, Barbara Nowak, became the owners of the entire 350 acre original Rasmus farm. Two children, Patrick and Lisa, were born to John and Barbara. Today the property is still owned by the Rasmus family. **

One Year With St. Joseph Hospital

During the past month, staff and volunteers of the Historical Society visited two of the past locations of St. Joseph's Hospital. It's been just over a year since the hospital announced its closing, and April 2nd marked one year since the Historical Society began taking in some of its material history.

The news is still shocking. For generations, St. Joe's had been a place where lives began, where healing happened, and where losses were met with compassion. The hospital's origins lay with the origins of Chippewa Falls itself— European missionaries, Father Goldsmith's church on the hill, and the logging boom. It evolved as the city and county did, and the story of St. Joseph's is inseparable from the stories that are told at the History Center.

One year later, the Historical Society remains humbled to serve as caretakers of the St. Josoeph Hospital legacy. In the months following the closure, we it received dozens of artifacts, documents, instruments, and personal items that now reside within our walls. They are not just objects, they're memories ... an ID bracelet for a newborn, worn photo albums of Sisters and staff, medical textbooks relied on for answers to every ailment.

The exhibit about St. Joseph's opened last November - not as an unalloyed celebration, but as a pensive commemoration. From members and visitors alike, many strong emotions and vivid memories of the institution have been shared. We didn't want to be in this position, but I am glad we were here to preserve the St. Joe's story. I hope you feel the same.

The work continues. Volunteers installed the gazebo from the hospital campus on our grounds last fall, and I have been so pleased to see it become a very popular spot for Irvine Park visitors and people looking for a place to rest or eat lunch.

We also held the first Legacy Lights event this past winter, another part of the St. Joseph's story. We look forward to holding it again in a few months.

In other words, the Historical Society is taking on this responsibility from many different angles, and we do not take it lightly. To preserve the memory of St. Joseph's is to acknowledge what was lost while still preserving its memory in Chippewa. We are still looking for new stories and artifacts. St. Joseph's history belongs not to the History Center, but to the entire community— just like the hospital did. **

Since the last Eagle Speaks newsletter, the Chippewa County Genealogical Society has had some great monthly meeting speakers. 

Stanley Area Historical Society

The Stanley Area Historical Museum will be opening for the summer/fall season the weekend of June 7 and 8. Thanks to our cadre of wonderful volunteers, we will be open Saturdays and Sundays from 1–4 pm through Oct. 4. We are fortunate to have returning Landon Wilson, who was with us as a UW-Eau Claire student intern last season. He is an excellent researcher and very helpful for anyone seeking to explore local history. We expect him to also be able to keep current the digitization of new artifact donations.

Our 2025 major projects have been completed and most importantly, have been paid for, thanks to volunteer labor and the generous support of our membership. We have a new furnace in the original museum building, the air conditioning system throughout the museum has been updated, a closure of a basement exit has been completed, and new exit steps have been constructed to accommodate any need for use in an emergency.

Our most recent publication, "Vintage Views of Stanley, Wisconsin, Brought to Life With Color," is still available for sale at our museum and we expect Betty Plombon's release of her research that will be published in book form in September. It will cover four major topic areas gleaned from her research of early Stanley history.

We invite you to come and see what we have accomplished in the over 12,000 square feet that hold our collections. Visitors are generally amazed at our exhibits and what we have available for researching one's family history. While there is going to be street reconstruction on one corner of our museum, we expect this will not restrict access to it. The walk will be no more than needed to get into the Chippewa County Historical Society Museum.
